revealed hrough a recent survey, our able residents revealed how urgently they want to get back to work, to have a sense of purpose, to be independent. Re-entering the workforce requires job readiness and stability even for those residents entering low-paying, "invisible" servicesector jobs — the person who serves us coffee, makes our hotel beds or works the cash register at our local store. But it is work, and that means a chance to rebuild.

Embracing this request to get back to work, Caritas proudly hires many of our residents as site managers and cleaners for our buildings. We have added onsite case workers to assist with job readiness and placement in our two largest buildings, home to 190 formerly homeless residents. Caritas has partnered with Project Hope, which will offer onsite counseling and job training to another 40 formerly homeless residents. And The Home Depot is providing a direct line to

employment opportunities at their stores local to Caritas residences. These partnerships help to meet a critical component of our mission of helping residents achieve self-sufficiency and a sense of self-worth. ■

Transition is a place in life that one feels lost, alone — an outsider looking in. I've lived here gratefully for 15 months off the streets where I was after I lost my footing in life and had no place to land. Many men that live here are in the same boat. Living here makes one feel that things are going to be OK. Toni runs this place respectful and fair to each individual. It's amazing that when someone says 'Good morning' or 'How are you?' it can maintain its effect on the self-esteem of a man who has lived on the streets. It's the little things — not the big noticeable jousters — that make this place a second chance."

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Sydney Street – A Trifecta of Partnerships

Sydney Street is home to 12 residents, most living below the poverty level. They include an older man who is a talented artist, a middleaged woman with a disability and a women in her 20's working the overnight shift at a pharmacy and going to college during the day. Sydney Street means safety and relief — a place where they can exhale and find comfort. For some, it is the launch pad to the life they are trying to build with few resources. For others, it is a permanent home.

A Caritas community of donors and volunteers has come together to upgrade this home. The Home Depot's dedicated Pro Team recently re-painted



the interior of the three-story residence, and Behr Paint donated the paint. People's United Bank has graciously awarded a grant to re-side the home. And NEWiRE has adopted the women of Sydney Street as the recipients of their collection of essential items and will be landscaping the property.

wen is like a ray of sunshine. She has a beautiful smile. She has been living at Sydney Street for seven years and works a full time job helping people with mental illness. For two years she also served as the Caritas live-in site manager, taking care of the physical well-being of the building and often the emotional well-being of the residents. At times, it was difficult for her to be both manager and friend helping others work through hard times. "Everyone has something," she says. Two years ago she passed the torch and has been a resident ever since.

Over the years, Gwen lived with her mother in different apartments while raising her son and then with a boyfriend who didn't put her name on the lease. "When they put me out, I had no place to go." Gwen was able to avoid going to a shelter because she had seen a Caritas banner, filled out the application and was offered a room. "I didn't want to have to share a bathroom and kitchen, but once I moved in and lived here I knew that I could do this. God



bless the child that has a key to a door. If you have a door, no matter how big or small, you are blessed. I have a key to a door — no one can put me out, and I love that truth."

Gwen is a mother and grandmother. She sees her 35-year-old son and grandson every Sunday. "They are my pride and joy."

"Caritas helped me to get on my feet. They take care of utilities, lights, gas, toilet paper and paper towels. This home has enabled me to put a little money in the bank for my future and to build good credit. Responsibility is a must in this world. I have gained so much and feel like it's time to move on and let someone else have my room who needs it more. It's time to spread my wings. I would suggest Caritas for anyone looking to get on their feet. Caritas is the best place to go. I know it was for me."
